On the ballot as well on May 3, 2016 is a very important choice of keeping our elections in May or moving them to November. Council voted to put it on the ballot for citizens to decide, so this is your choice. This is your Town – Get out and vote!

PUBLIC NOTICE – SPECIAL ELECTION
MAY 3, 2016
FOR A CHARTER CHANGE FOR THE TOWN OF DUMFRIES, VIRGINIA**

A Special Election will be held on Tuesday, May 3, 2016, for registered voters of the Town of Dumfries to consider a proposed charter amendment to change the Election Day for the Mayor and Town Council Members from May in even-numbered years to November in even-numbered years beginning in 2018, and to make other changes in points of detail. On May 3, 2016, the ballot will read as follows:



“Shall the Town request the General Assembly to amend its existing charter to provide for the Town to elect its Mayor and Council Members at the November general election date in even-numbered years beginning in 2018, and to make associated changes in the charter?”

A “**Yes**” vote means that you desire to move the Election Day for the Mayor and Town Council Members of the Town of Dumfries to November beginning in 2018.

A “**No**” vote means you desire for the Election Day for the Mayor and Town Council Members of the Town of Dumfries to remain in May.

TOWN OF DUMFRIES REAL ESTATE TAXES

The 2016 first half real estate tax bills will be mailed May 5, 2016. All bills are due on or before the close of business on June 5, 2016. Payments not received by the due date will be assessed a ten (10%) percent penalty. If you have a mortgage on your home, your mortgage company typically pays your real estate taxes and you will not receive a bill from the Town.

Town of Dumfries Pedestrian Safety Reminders

The Dumfries Police Department wants to remind citizens warmer weather means more people will be out on foot and on bicycles.

Driver behaviors that are known to contribute to vehicle crashes with pedestrians and bicycles include:

- * Speeding
- * Running red lights
- * Running stop signs
- * Driving without headlights at night
- * Driving without headlights when visibility is reduced, such as rain, fog, and situations when a driver cannot see 500 feet away
- * Failure to yield to pedestrians

Actions by drivers and pedestrians that will reduce risks include:

- * Using crosswalks
- * Obeying traffic signals
- * Looking left-right-left before walking, riding, turning, changing lanes, etc.
- * Slowing down
- * Stopping for pedestrians

By working together, we can reduce traffic crashes involving pedestrians and bicycles.

Let's all work together to make Dumfries a safer place to live, play, and work!



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NEWS FROM THE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

American Disposal Service provides routine trash pickup, recycling and yard waste collection for residents every Wednesday throughout the Town. Trash receptacles should be placed curbside no earlier than 5pm on Tuesday. Keep in mind not to block the mail carrier's access to the mail box so delivery of the mail can still be made. Everyday household waste (i.e. kitchen and bathroom waste) is acceptable in your curbside collection container.



Hazardous waste such as car batteries, dead animals, fire extinguishers etc. along with electronics waste, construction debris and large landscaping debris is unacceptable. Construction waste such as concrete (powder or solid form), brick, block, asphalt, siding, pallets, etc. cannot be collected curbside. Contact American Disposal Service @ 703-368-0500 to see if your construction waste warrants a special pick up or is best suited for roll off dumpster service, which can handle large amounts of renovation or construction waste.

Grass clippings and leaves are to be placed curbside in brown paper bags or unbagged in clear containers labeled 'yard waste'. Each tree limb or piece of brush must be no longer than 4 feet in length and 3 inches thick in diameter. Limbs and brush must be bundled with rope or twine for ease of collection. American Disposal Service will collect up to 10 bags or bundles. Items that are bagged, bundled or placed in your cart may not exceed 50 lbs.

Mulch, dirt, rock and sod cannot be placed at the curbside. For an alternative, more eco-friendly method for yard waste disposal, consider starting your own backyard compost pile and/or leaving your grass clippings on your lawn in order to replenish the nutrients in the soil, ensuring a healthy-looking lawn.

If you have large bulky items such as mattresses, box springs, sofas, grills, lawn mowers etc., that exceed the capacity of a standard trash or recycling cart, a specialty pickup may be needed to dispose of that item. These requests operate on a different schedule than your regular curbside collection. Charges may apply. Call American Disposal Service to set up an appointment @ 703-368-0500.

On Saturday, April 16th, the Town of Dumfries will participate in the 28th Annual Potomac River Watershed Cleanup sponsored by the Alice Ferguson Foundation as part of their Trash Free Potomac Watershed initiative. The cleanup is the largest regional event of its kind with participants from all over Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, and Washington DC gathering at various sites to cleanup portions of the Potomac River Watershed. Last year, almost 24,000 volunteers joined together to support the Trash Free Potomac Watershed Initiative. The Town looks forward to the opportunity to once again participate in this event by engaging residents to cleanup Quantico Creek, a tributary to the Potomac. The Quantico Creek Cleanup is a great opportunity for anyone looking for community service hours. We invite everyone interested in participating to join us on April 16th at 8:30 am. Volunteers will meet at the Simpson Community Center located at 17755 Main St. Dumfries, VA 22026.

Town of Dumfries Dog Ordinance Reminders

The Dumfries Police Department wants to remind citizens of several Town Ordinances regarding civic responsibilities in controlling dogs in your possession.

Town Code 10-30 requires that all dogs leaving the property where they live must be on a leash and in the control of a responsible person.

Town Code 10-31 requires dog owners obtain a license tag from the Prince William County Animal Control Bureau.

Town Code 10-32 requires any person who knowingly allows any animal in their possession to urinate or defecate on the property of another without their permission must immediately clean up the excrement.

The IRS Urges the Public to Stay Alert for Scam Phone Calls

The IRS continues to warn customers to guard against scam phone calls from thieves intent on stealing their money or their identity. Criminals pose as the IRS to trick victims out of their money or personal information. Here are some tips to help you avoid being a victim of these scams.

The IRS will not:

- ◆ Call you to demand immediate payment.
- ◆ Call you if you owe taxes without first sending you a bill in the mail.
- ◆ Demand you pay taxes and not allow you to question or appeal the amount you owe.
- ◆ Require you pay your taxes a certain way (ex: they will not require you pay with a prepaid debit card).
- ◆ Ask for your credit or debit card numbers over the phone.
- ◆ Threaten to bring in police or other agencies to arrest you for not paying.

If you get a phone call from someone claiming to be from the IRS, here's what you should do:

- ◆ If you know you owe taxes, or think you might owe taxes, call the IRS at 1-800-829-1040.
- ◆ If you do not owe taxes or have no reason to think you owe taxes (ex: you have never received a bill or the caller made some bogus threats as described above), then call and report the incident to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration at 1-800-366-4484.

The IRS does not initiate contact with taxpayers by email to request personal information. This includes any type of electronic communication, such as text messages and social media channels. Recipients should not open any attachments or click on any links contained in a message. Instead, the email should be forwarded to phishing@irs.gov The IRS will not have you pay through pre-loaded debit cards or wire transfers.

If you have been a victim of an IRS scam, you should file a report with the Dumfries Police Department (703-792-6500). If you have been targeted by this scam, contact the Federal Trade Commission and use their "FTC Complaint Assistant" at FTC.gov
Please add "IRS Telephone Scam" to the comments in your complaint.

Spring is here! We all know that “Spring Showers bring May flowers”. However, sometimes spring weather brings much more than showers. Each year in the United States, lightning kills an average of 53 people. Every thunderstorm produces lightning, and has the potential for other dangers, including tornadoes, strong winds, hail, wildfires and flash flooding. Lightning is unpredictable, which increases its risk to individuals and property. It often strikes outside of heavy rain and can travel up to 15 miles in any direction. Most lightning deaths and injuries occur when people are caught outdoors in a thunderstorm during the afternoon and evening.

Watches and Warnings:

- * Thunderstorm Watch: there is a possibility of a thunderstorm in your area.
- * Thunderstorm Warning: a thunderstorm is occurring or will likely occur soon. Take shelter immediately.

Prepare for a Thunderstorm and Lightning

- * Remove dead or rotting trees and branches that could fall during a severe thunderstorm and cause injury or damage.
- * Use the 30/30 lightning safety rule. If you see lightning and you cannot count to 30 before hearing thunder, go indoors. Then stay indoors for 30 minutes after hearing the last clap of thunder.

Have a Thunderstorm Plan

When Outside:

- * If a thunderstorm is likely in your area, postpone outdoor activities.
- * Watch for darkening skies, lightning, and increasing winds.
- * Go inside a sturdy, enclosed building. If no building is close, get in the car and avoid touching metal surfaces.
- * If no shelter or car is available, go to the lowest area nearby and make yourself the smallest target possible. Do not lie flat on the ground.
- * If on open water, get to land and shelter immediately.

Avoid:

- * Any tall, isolated trees in an open area, hilltops, open fields, the beach, a boat on the water, isolated sheds and small structures in open areas. Anything metal—tractors, farm equipment, motorcycles, golf clubs, bicycles, etc.

When Indoors:

- * Secure outdoor objects that could blow away or cause damage. Secure outside doors. Close blinds, or curtains.
- * Avoid showering or bathing during a thunderstorm. Plumbing and bathroom fixtures can conduct electricity.
- * Do not use electrical items such as computers or televisions as power surges from lightning can result in serious damage.
- * A corded telephone should only be used in an emergency, but cordless phones and cell phones are safe to use.

Stay Informed

- * Listen to weather-alert radios to stay informed of thunderstorm watches and warnings.
- * Also monitor commercial radio, television and the Internet.
- * Keep in mind, after a thunderstorm, it could be hours, or days, before emergency personnel are able to reach you.

When it comes to tornadoes, there's no such thing as a "tornado season." Tornadoes can strike anywhere, anytime, and you need to know what to do. Tornadoes are nature's most violent storms. They can appear suddenly without warning and can be invisible until dust and debris are picked up or a funnel cloud appears. You should plan so you are prepared to act quickly.

Know the Signs

- * Strong, persistent rotation in the base of a cloud
- * Whirling dust or debris on the ground under a cloud base – tornadoes sometimes have no visible funnel
- * Hail or heavy rain followed by still or a fast, intense wind shift. Many tornadoes, especially in Virginia, are wrapped in heavy rain and cannot be seen.
- * Loud, continuous roar or rumble, which does not fade in a few seconds like thunder
- * At night, look for small, bright, blue-green to white flashes at ground level (as opposed to silvery lightning up in the clouds). These lights are power lines being snapped by very strong wind, perhaps a tornado.



Prepare

- * Get a NOAA Weather Radio with warning alarm tone and battery backup to get information directly from the National Weather Service. This is the quickest way to learn that a tornado is heading your way.
- * Determine where you will take cover in case of a tornado warning, and keep this safe location uncluttered. Storm cellars or basements provide the best protection.
- * If underground shelter is not available, go into an interior room that has no windows, or a closet or hall way on the lowest floor possible.
- * Stay away from windows, doors and outside walls. Go to the center of the room. Stay away from corners because they attract debris.
- * If you are in a high-rise building, you may not have enough time to go to the lowest floor. Pick a place in a hallway in the center of the building.
- * A vehicle, trailer or mobile home does not provide good protection. Plan to go quickly to a building with a strong foundation, if possible.
- * Get a kit of emergency supplies. Store it in your shelter location.
- * Practice tornado drills at least once a year.

During

- * When a tornado watch is issued, stay tuned to local radio, TV and NOAA weather radio for further information and possible warnings. Be prepared to take cover.
- * When a tornado warning is issued, take cover in a safe location immediately or on the lowest level of the nearest substantial building. Protect your body from flying debris with a heavy blanket, pillows, sofa cushions or a mattress.
- * If you cannot get to your safe location or the lowest level of a substantial building:
 - * Open buildings (shopping mall, gym or civic center): Try to get into a restroom or interior hallway. If there is no time, get up against something that will support or deflect falling debris. Protect your head by covering it with your arms.
 - * Cars and trucks, and outdoor: Get out of your vehicle and try to find shelter inside a sturdy building. A culvert or ditch can provide shelter if a substantial building is not nearby. Lie down flat and cover your head with your hands. Do not get under an overpass or bridge. You are safer in a low, flat location.
 - * Mobile homes: Do not stay in a mobile home. Leave immediately and seek shelter inside a nearby sturdy building, or lie down in a ditch away from your home, covering your head with your hands. Mobile homes are extremely unsafe during tornadoes.
 - * Stay in your safe location until the danger has passed.

After

- * Stay out of damaged buildings and stay clear of downed power lines.
- * Help injured or trapped people.
- * Check on those who might need special assistance (ex: elderly, children, and people with disabilities)

Watches and Warnings

Learn the terms that are used to identify a tornado.

Tornado Watch: a tornado is possible in your area. You should monitor weather-alert radios and local radio and TV stations for information.

Tornado Warning: a tornado has been sighted in your area or has been indicated by National Weather Service Doppler radar. When a warning is issued, take cover immediately.

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Inoperable Vehicles on Residential Properties

With spring cleaning projects on everyone's mind, now is a good time to remind residents of zoning code enforcement in the Town when it comes to the outside storage of inoperable vehicles on residential properties. Section 62-210 of the Dumfries Town Code states that "it shall be unlawful for any person to keep, except within a fully enclosed building or structure or otherwise shielded from view, on any property zoned for residential or commercial purposes, any motor vehicle, trailer or semi-trailer which is inoperable."

Furthermore, *inoperable vehicle* is defined as:

"Any motor vehicle, trailer or semi-trailer which is not in operating condition; or which for a period of 60 days or longer has been partially or totally disassembled by the removal of tires and wheels, the engine, or other essential parts required for the operation of the vehicle; or on which there are displayed neither valid license plates nor a valid inspection decal."

Not only do inoperable vehicles present an eyesore and affect nearby properties, they can also present environmental issues with the leakage of fuel and oil from the vehicle. Town staff will be actively enforcing this code provision, and violation notices will be given for any property found to be in violation of this code. Please work with the Town by ensuring that inoperable vehicles are stored properly on your property.
